Leftover pesticides should never be poured down the drain, including indoor drains, outdoor drains, or gutters/storm drains. Pesticides should also never be burned, buried, or dumped on the ground as a means of disposal.

Herb Study Caraway

Caraway is a biennial plant of the family Apiaceae, or Umbelliferae. which also includes celery, carrot, parsnips, fennel, parsley, and other fragrant flowering plants. Carum carvi is the only caraway under cultivation. Caraway is usually grown from seed, giving rise to an herbaceous plant with thin stalks and fine leaves in its first year.
